TWO-DAY CAPACITY BUILDING WORKSHOP ON MATERNAL HEALTHCARE SERVICES IN ỘYỘ STATE ____

We successfully conducted a two-day capacity building workshop between the 8th and 9th of May, focusing on enhancing maternal health care services in 0y6 State. This workshop drew participants from various women groups, female members of the Ward Development Council (WDC), and Officers-in-Charge of Primary Health care Centers across the u local government areas in baddan Land.

The event aimed at empowering those at the foreform of maternal health care delivery in dys State. providing them with the necessary tools to improve Health care services in their communities. The workshop featured a series of enlightening talks and interactive discussions designed to deepen the participants' understanding of maternal health care services in the State.

Key sessions of the workshop included discussions on harnessing health insurance for maternal health care services, where the Executive Sceretary the Qvo State flealth Insurance Agency (OYSHIA), Dr. Olusola Akande highlighted the state's commitment to maixing the insurance premium available and easily accessible to primary healthcare facilities in the state. In addition, our Chief of staff, Adenike Ibitara Esq. gave a robust enlightenment on the dignity and rights of patients in maternal health care services, emphasizing the need to respect and uphold the rights of women during the care process. Participants expressed their appreciations for the workshop, noting that the knowledge gained and the technical capacity built, would significantly enhance their capacities to deliver better maternal health care services and more importantly advocate for patient rights and diquity.



The workshop didn't end without the inputs of Health care professionals, where Dr. Faidat Adenuqa and Mrs. Funmilayo Abodunrin of the **Òvó** State Primary Healthcare Board shed lights on how to understand the Maternal Healthcare Services in Òvó State and as well discussed the Issues and challenges of Maternal Healthcare in the State while they deliberated on the way forward with the participants at the workshop.

This capacity building initiative marks a critical step towards achieving improved maternal health outcomes in our dear State; as it brings together key stakeholders dedicated to making a positive impact on maternal health care services.



Market Rally to Commemorate World Children's Day 2024

In a powerful display of solidarity and commitment, the Öyö state chapter of Network Against Child Trafficking, Abuse and Labour (NACTAL), a coalition dedicated to combating child trafficking, abuse, and labor, invited us in our capacity as a member of Child Protection Network (CFN) to participate in a marker traffic they organized on the 2nd of May. 2024, in commemoration of this year's Children's Day. The event, held in the bustling heart of the Bóli İg e International marker (Obid), saw enthusiastic participation from community members, activists, and concerned citizens.

Participants marched through the market, carrying banners and chanting slogans to raise awareness about the urgent need to protect children from exploitation and harm. The rally aimed to highlight the ongoing issues of child trafficking, abuse, and labor, and to call for stronger measures to asfeguard the rights and well-being of every child.

Speakers at the event included representatives from the Child Protection Network, Network Against Child Trafficking, Abuse and Labour and other stakeholders, including the Nigerian Immigration Service (NIS),

National Agency for the Prohibition of Trafficking in Fersons (NAFTIP) emphasized the importance of community involvement in the fight against child exploitation. The rally concluded with a call to action, urging everyone to remain vigilant and proactive in protecting the youngest and most vulnerable members of society.



The market rally was a resounding success, bringing much-needed attention to the critical issues affecting children and reinforcing the community's commitment to ensuring a safe and secure future for all.

offenses. It is our belief that such an approach not only benefits the community but also supports offenders in turning their lives around. The meeting with the NDE marks a crucial milestone in our efforts to ensure that those who community serve service sentences are provided with opportunities to reintegrate into society seamlessly.

During the meeting, both parties discussed various strategies to facilitate the employment of exoffenders. Key points of discussion included the development of job training programs, vocational training, and other skill-building initiatives tailored to the needs of former offenders. The NDE expressed strong support for these initiatives, acknowledging the importance of providing ex-offenders with the tools they need to secure stable employment and avoid recidivism.

The Ovó State Coordinator of the NDE, Mrs. Olayinka Steve Oqundipe, who played host to our team, made it known that NDE is not just about white collar employment but also involves empowering Nigerians in vocational training. She emphasized the agency's commitment to collaborating with organizations like ours to enhance the employability of ex-offenders.

"We are willing to work with you to reintegrate the ex-offenders into society. By providing you with the necessary access to recommend a number of ex-offenders to benefit from our periodic vocational training and placement opportunities, we are not only helping them rebuild their lives but also strengthening our communities," she stated.

The current state of the nation is completely chaotic, so formless that the common man on the street is so clueless of where the next meal will come from. In this piece, Michael Arasanmi, an account officer in our organization delves into the discussions of inflation as he gives professional advices on the best practices in a time like this.

Inflation Explained

Inflation is used year after year to characterize the rising prices of goods and services. Simply put, it is the rate of increase in prices of goods and services across the economy over a given period of time, consequent upon which it is often difficult for the rate of wage and income growth to keep up with the rate of inflation, this causes the consumers' purchasing power to decline. Looking into the past years, inflation rate was 21.34% as at December 2022. In December 2023, it increased to 28.94% and now 39.55% in May 2024 as disclosed by the National Bureau of Statistics.

Effects of Inflation

Rising prices referred to as inflation, have an impact on the cost of living, the cost of doing business, borrowing money, mortgages, yields on corporate and government bonds, and any other part of the economy. Inflation is calculated by subtracting an item's original cost from its present cost, divide the result by the original cost and multiply by ioo.

At low rates, it keeps the economy healthy. But when the rate rises rapidly, it can result in lower purchasing power, higher interest rates, slower economic growth and other negative economic effects.

Inflation can be both beneficial and in some instances, negative for economic recovery. The negative effects of inflation include an increase in the cost of monocy keeping opportunities, uncertainty about potential inflation that could deter investment and savings, and if inflation is too rapid, shortages of goods as consumers start hoarding out of fear that future prices will rise. Inflation has positive effects on the economy in the following ways: INFLATION IN THE CONTEXT OF NIGERIA ECONOMY, by Michael Arasanmi

- 1. Higher profits as manufacturers are able to sell at higher rate
- 2.Better returns on investment provided that investors and entrepreneurs are given incentives to invest in profitable activities output increase.



"Excess of everything is bad" this phrase rightly describes the necessity of controlling inflation. When a country faces acute inflation, there is a high-interest rate which incapacitate people from embarking on big projects that can in turn help the economy, thus subjecting the entire populace to untold hardship.

Inflation can be controlled through the monetary policy which primarily involves changing interest rates to control inflation. Government, through the fiscal policy (this has to do with the Government spending, public borrowing and taxes) can assist in fighting inflation.

The best methods to control inflation in Nigeria are:

 Review your budget: If you don't have a budget, it is tin to create one. A budget is simply a plan for your mone Without a plan, it's easy to let that hard-earned naira sl through your fingers. As the cost of everything goes up, budget can help you to make more informed and inflation friendly decisions.

While there is likely nothing you can do about the cost of rent or your mortgage, you might be able to reduce the size of your subscription or entertainment budget.

2. Batch errands: With the price of fuel, commuting or running multiple errands in a week can get expensive. Rather than driving back and forth to the store whenever you need something, try batching your errands so you can accomplish all of them in one trip. The same goes if you use public transit or a ride-sharing service. The more errands you can do in a single trip, the more you can save.

3. Fiscal measures: These include reduction in unnecessary expenditure, increase in taxes, increase in savings, surplus budgets (it is a situation that occurs when income exceeds expenditure) and public deb(a debt or loan taken by the government from its own people, organizations as well as from foreign countries).

4. Other measures include price control, rational wage policy (these are principles acting as guidelines for determining a wage structure) and increase in production.

How to Calculate Inflation Rate


To better understand how inflation is calculated, we can use an example. In this example we calculate inflation for a basket that has two items in it -beans and rice. The formula for calculating inflation for a single item is below:

Inflation = Price (year 2) - Price (year 1) x 100

Price (year 1)

The price of a congo of beans was N1,500 in 2023 (year 1) and the price increased to N4,000 in 2024 (year 2). The price of a congo of rice was N1,200 in 2023, and this increased to N3,000 in 2024

Items	2023	2024	Inflation Rate
Beans	N1,500	N4,000	166.7%
Rice	N1,200	N3,000	150%


